In 1890's Lansdale, all news was fair game

With summer upon us, this seems like an appropriate time to look back to those simpler times of 1890 through the prose of H. M. Woodmansee, editor of the Lansdale Reporter.

Keep in mind that in 1890, local newspapers were the primary source of all types of news, including gossip. With no radio, TV or Internet, people were hungry for anything that could spark conversation, whether it be on the front porch or at the neighborhood watering hole. Step back with us now 120 years – the summer of 1890. The headlines are ours:

HOT TIMES IN THE PARK: "Lansdale Park will be marking its annual grand opening on Decoration Day, May 30, with events all day and evening. The North Wales Cornet Band will furnish music afternoon and evening. The Lansdale Gun Club will have a shoot at targets for prizes. All good marksmen are invited to attend.

"The Lansdale Base Ball Club will contest with a first-class club from Philadelphia. Boating, fishing, swings, see-saws, shooting gallery, flying horse, etc. will be available.

"J.W. White, owner, advises that groups planning excursions can secure them by contacting him."

(The following week it was reported that the Lansdale ball team won easily in an uninteresting game that followed Grand Army of the Republic ceremonies at the Music Hall. The weather was warm, pleasant and the day was enjoyed by all).

WASTE MEAT, SAVE ICE: "A number of ice consumers of this town have concluded to use little or no ice for the season at the prices being demanded at present. The

butchers say they can afford to allow a portion of their meats to waste every day at the prices which they are compelled to pay for ice and are acting on that plan."

WHO NEEDS AN EXERCISE BALL? "A huge radish, 13 inches long and 18 inches in circumference, was shown at The Reporter office the other day. It was grown on Davis Longaker's lot and is now on display behind the Junction House bar. Who can beat it?"

YOU'RE GROUNDED! "The pupils of the Lansdale public schools will be interested by the publication of the complete list of averages attained at the general examination held prior to the close of the past term. It will also of great interest the parents of the pupils."

nues. It greatly enhances the desirability of lots in that section for building purposes, and converts unsightly streets into pretty driveways."


