Homestead projects for 2011

Several projects are in the works for the Jenkins Homestead before the end of the year.

One of the projects is overdue. The cellar door and portions of the side porch have seen better days and are in need of replacement. The cellar door, which dates back to the days when the homestead was an apartment house, is rotted beyond repair and will be replaced.

The sitting porch on the Jenkins Avenue side of the house was installed after the historical society moved in. Much of the wood has rotted, split and come apart, raising potential safety issues. We are currently getting estimates to replace the porch floor, steps and seats.

This year's interior project is a carryover from 2010: Renovating the society's old second-floor office into a tax assessor's study similar to one John Jenkins I may have had in the house during the late 1700s.

Work on the room will proceed as funds permit. Out hope is to have it completed in time for a holiday event at the homestead in December.
