Learn how to trace your family roots

Almost everyone talks about tracing their family roots but how many of us fear taking the first leap into the world of the past?

Quite a few from what we've heard from members and visitors to our research center.

With that in mind the Lansdale Historical Society will kick off its 2015-16 Community Program season with a change of pace from our usual fare.

"Who Are My Peeps? – Six Easy Steps to Starting Your Family History Research" will be the topic of our Tuesday, Sept. 8 show, 7:30 p.m., at the Lansdale Parks and Recreation Building.

The presenter will be Christine Roberts, founder and charter president of the Bucks County Genealogical Society, who will cut through the confusion of family

searches using her six simple steps, which include examination of basic genealogical records, documentation and examples from her own personal research.

In addition to her Bucks County

affiliation, Roberts serves on the First Families of Pennsylvania Committee of the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania. She is also a member of the National Genealogical Society, the New York Genealogical and Historical Society, the New England Historical and Biographical Society and the Association of Professional Genealogists.

It's a great opportunity for members of the North Penn community - young and old - to begin your family search on the right foot with advice from an expert.

Look into the life of historian Edward Mathews

It is next to impossible to describe Edward Mathews in a few simple paragraphs or limit his accomplishments to a short list. "E.M.", as he signed many of his works, was an historian who wrote in exhaustive detail about the people and happenings of our region during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

As we approach the 100th anniversary of Mathews' death, society member Donald Lewis will describe "E.M.'s" unconventional life at our October 13 Community Program at the Lansdale Parks and Recreation Building at 7:30 p.m.

Calling Mathews "unconventional" is actually an understatement. His life was complicated by a number of serious illnesses that dogged him through the years. He had strong likes and dislikes, especially when it came to people he encountered, yet he managed to gather the most complete collection of historical information during that time.

Although he tried many jobs, he was most successful at gathering news items for almost every weekly newspaper in the region. His diaries became reference sources for many historians who followed him.

Mathews traveled the

countryside by trolley and bicycle, settling for a time in Lansdale where he lived quietly in a back-alley room away from the bustle of Main Street.

Don Lewis has spent considerable time re-

searching the many facets of Mathews' life and writings. He has previously delved into other local topics including the origin of Lansdale's street names and the question of where Gen. Winfield Scott Hancock was really born.
