North Penn Area Trivia Night Returns


The Society's program for Tuesday evening, March 14th will be hosted by Dick Shearer.

Visitors to the Jenkins Homestead often wonder about the lives of the families who lived in the historic home. Until recently, we knew little of the Jenkins family. They were surely farmers, and they were early members of Montgomery Baptist Church, where many of the Jenkins family are buried in the adjoining cemetery.

Lansdale Historical Society member Ruth Madison was curious to know "the rest of the story" about the Jenkinses. She began with an Ancestry.com search of Jenkin Jenkins, the earliest member of the Jenkins family in this area. From his birth in Wales in the 17th century, Madison has traced the Jenkins family tree to the present day descendants.

Using a variety of resources, Madison discovered detailed information about a number of members of the Jenkins family. She found that the Jenkins family was well-to-do. The early residents of the Homestead traded in land. The crops they farmed were for their own use. Their interests and occupations were varied: Horace Jenkins ran a bowling alley at 305 W. Main Street, and Grant Jenkins installed the heating system at William Penn Inn. Leila Jenkins was a lawyer, and in 1902 became the second woman to be admitted to the bar in Montgomery County.

Madison's interest in genealogy has spanned the past 26 years, in which time she has done extensive research on her own family tree. She still enjoys seeking out new information about her ancestors, as well as the Jenkins family.

She started out by searching online sites, such as Ancestry, Rootsweb, and Genealogy.com. Later, she found information in archived newspapers. She was surprised to find that out-of-state newspapers often contained more information about the family than local papers. Madison is grateful to other genealogical researchers who have passed along articles and documents they have found about the Jenkins family. Of particular note is the donation of about 80 Jenkins family photos which were donated to the society by May Jenkins Tussey.

Now, when visitors to the Homestead wonder about the lives of the Jenkins family, they may find a photo journal of the family in the Assessor's Office. Thanks to Ruth Madison, we have a much more complete picture of Lansdale's first family.

For those who are conducting their own family research, our Research Center Library contains family histories of more than 75 area families.

Our library archives also contain genealogical information on many Schwenkfelder families.



Our Tree is No. I Again

For the second consecutive year, the Historical Society's entry in the annual Lansdale Christmas Tree Display captured the first place award.
